Call to Order

- Board President Andy Cassell called the meeting to order at 7:36 p.m.

- Others present: Marsha Cassell, Administrative Assistant; Shannon McClain, Swim Team; and Phyllis Sisolak.

Secretary's Report – August Minutes will be approved next month.

Treasurer's Report – There is \$168,653 in checking and \$261,508 in CDs.

Member Business

• The ARC received complaints about some excessively high grass and unregistered (abandoned) car.

ARC – Board approved a new administrative assistant for the ARC.

Landscape – No report.

<u>Conservation Corps</u> – No report.

Neighborhood Watch - No report.

Newsletter – New editor to transition in the coming months.

<u>Playgroup</u> – No report.

<u>Pool</u> – End of Season was a success. Three companies are bidding for the 2022 pool management contract which typically lasts for 3 years. Our current pool operator (NV Pools) will be among the bids. Pool management companies are having difficulty finding adequate staffing in general. Re-webbing costs are up, but still cheaper than replacing furniture. White coating of the pool floor may be performed in 2022 or 2023. Dog Day is scheduled for September 18 from 1:00-3:00 p.m.

<u>Social</u> – Oktoberfest is postponed to 2022 due to lack of someone to plan the event. The Halloween Parade and Magic Show will go on, with the stipulation that the magic show will NOT move to the clubhouse if it rains or is cold.

<u>Swim Team</u> – Waiting on the non-profit status (which is very close). Winter swim is a new offering this year at the Herndon Community Center.

<u>Tennis</u> – All inquiries for the combination to the tennis court/pickleball court should be sent to Alex Fletcher by e-mail at kchoa.tennis@gmail.com or text 703-582-8382.

Welcome – Four homes were welcomed.

Old Business

- 298 of 537 (55%) of Kingston Chase lots have voted in favor of the Declaration Revision. 403 votes (75%) are needed for it to pass.
- Clubhouse voted to be reopened by August 15 to allow proper signage and waivers to be completed per lawyers.

New Business

- 2022 Budget items were solicited and are due by October 31.
- Electronic Voting Resolution will be voted on at the October Board Meeting.
- Clubhouse to be re-keyed. The Board is researching options.

Meeting adjourned to Executive Session at 8:30 p.m.

• Board approved Phyllis Sisolak to phase into the Administrative Assistant roles for the HOA in addition to ARC.

This is also an excellent time to check for and clear any overgrowth between the road and road apron and storm drains near your house. While the roads and sidewalks in Kingston Chase are maintained by the county, the county does not come in and service that area frequently, so it is left to the homeowners to maintain and keep those areas tidy.

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Folley Lick Pond Near Kingston Chase Swimming Pool

At the recent Kingston Chase Board Meeting in September it was reminded that the pond behind the swimming pool is a "dry pond" and should be cleaned two times a year. From the Fairfax County website at https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/soil-water-conservation/understanding-stormwater-ponds the following explains in more detail about stormwater ponds in our area.

Stormwater ponds capture, control and filter runoff from roofs, roads and parking lots before it enters our local streams. In Fairfax County, the construction of stormwater ponds became a requirement for new development in the 1980s. Today, there are at least 2,162 stormwater ponds in Fairfax County; 1,325 are maintained by the county and the remaining ponds are privately maintained.

Why control runoff? When new roads and buildings are built, the increased amount and velocity of runoff can damage nearby streams. Streams will rise to new peak flows (the maximum amount of discharge after a rain or snow). If unmanaged, stream banks begin to erode under the increased flows. Sediment (soil), excess nutrients and other pollutants are carried downstream, negatively affecting aquatic life.

Stormwater ponds slow the flow of water, filter pollutants and improve stream health. Along with riparian buffers, rain gardens and other infiltration practices, they are an important tool to help protect local streams.

Wet Ponds and Dry Ponds: There are two general types of stormwater ponds — wet ponds and dry ponds.

How can a pond be dry? **A dry pond** is designed to hold water for a short period of time before allowing the water to discharge to a nearby stream. Dry ponds control peak flows of runoff, help improve water quality and lessen the effects of erosion. Between rain events, a dry pond looks like a large, grassy low area. When it rains, the pond fills with water. They hold water for 48-72 hours to allow sediment and pollutants to settle out. Because they detain water for a brief time before allowing it to flow out, dry ponds are also called **detention ponds**.


Wet ponds, on the other hand, maintain a permanent pool of water throughout the year. They remove pollutants by allowing sediment to settle as water slowly moves from one end of the pond to the other and through biological uptake, as plants absorb excess nutrients. Wet ponds frequently have smaller pools, plants and a wetland area. Wet pond water levels can increase dramatically as a result of rainstorms, like dry ponds. Because they retain water for a longer time, wet ponds are also called **retention ponds.**

Both wet and dry ponds remove sediment, phosphorus and other pollutants. Because water stays in them longer, wet ponds typically are able to remove more pollutants. Dry ponds are more common, however. They are less expensive to install, require less maintenance and may involve less liability for the communities around them.

The deadline for the November issue of the Kingston Chase Crier is October 15.


