329 of 537 (60 percent) of Kingston Chase lots have voted in favor of the Declaration Revision. 403 votes (75 percent) are needed for it to pass. 26 of 537 lots have voted against the Declaration Revision. Suggestion to provide Declaration communication in Spanish. Suggestion to visit residents who have not voted and provide ballot. Looking at sending out postcards with SASE to capture votes. Electronic voting on HOA business is now allowed in the state of Virginia. The Board is working with KCHOA lawyers to create written procedures for electronic participation.

New Business: The Board will be looking for a new President to replace Andy Cassell as his family relocates.

Welcome to the many new families who have joined the Kingston Chase community this spring and summer! For your reference, and for anyone else interested in a refresher, the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) would like to provide a quick review of the most commonly received applications and questions. For the complete ARC Guidelines, please visit www.kchoa.org/architectural-review-committee.

Applications: Any change to the exterior of the house or property (front, back, or sides) requires an ARC application before work begins. The only exceptions are landscaping and lawn ornaments less than two feet tall. When applying, please include with the application the house plat and details and pictures of the colors and materials to be used in the project.

Fences: All fences require an application. Kingston Chase allows board-on-board fences with no overlapping boards, estate fences, and picket fences. Stockade fences are not allowed and will not be approved.

Sheds: All sheds require an application. Sheds may not be more than 8.5 feet tall at their peak and must have an area of 160 square feet or less. Homeowners are encouraged to choose shed designs and colors that match the house and are in keeping with the earth tones found throughout the neighborhood.

Driveway Extensions: Driveway extensions require an ARC application and are considered on a case-by-case basis. They are rarely approved. Driveways cannot extend past the edge of the garage and Fairfax County does not allow any alteration to the apron, the piece of concrete or asphalt that connects the road, the sidewalk, and the driveway.

Neighborhood Watch

A bike was stolen Aug. 8 from in front of the Kingston Chase pool. We should all be reminded:

- 1. Any unattended bike should be immobilized. In most cases that doesn't mean a Whizzdang Quantum Kryptonite 5000 lock. Locking it in your garage or a simple combination lock and chain will work. Chain your bike to a fixed object so neither can be easily removed. We've all seen the memes of the left behind front wheels or "fixed" objects that can easily be circumvented. Parents can demonstrate examples for your kids.
- 2. Affix an identifying characteristic to your bike. In the olden days, that would mean the police engraving your SSN on it. That ain't gonna happen now, nor should it, as SSNs are vital components of identity theft. Some bikes have serial numbers. Record them. Make your bike inconspicuously "permanently" unique in some way. Record it. I'd

be willing to bet there are some great ideas or suggestions in our community.

- 3. Photograph your bike.
- 4. If it is stolen, report immediately.
