The Kingston Chase Playgroup was started in the mid 1980s (when the neighborhood was still being built) by a group of new moms looking to navigate parenthood in an unfamiliar place.

Flagship Avenue resident Mary Lou Minchak, one of the playgroup founders, shared that many of the original playgroup families had relocated to Herndon and didn't have relatives in the area. Moms would host meetups at each other's houses where they found friendship, support, and even free babysitting from time to time (members collected and cashed in poker chips to "pay" for childcare).

Minchak shared that the friendships her daughters formed in playgroup carried through to elementary school and on the neighborhood swim team.

She's happy to see that the tradition has carried on and that today, more dads are involved.

TRASH TALK Hide your refuse bins out of sight from street

The words "trash can" can be a hot topic around these parts. From neighbors frustrated with spotty trash service to neighbors peeved by their bins being used to dispose doggy doo from unfamiliar doggies (more like doggy don't!) — there's been no shortage of trash talking recently.

We're not one to put a sack in it (too much?), so here's the latest update from the waste disposal beat: The Kingston Chase HOA wants to remind residents that trash cans and bins should not be visible from the street.

According to the HOA, unsightly trash cans being in sight is the No. 1 ARC violation. One advantage of stashing your cans on the side of your house is they can cover up any algae that might be growing on your siding, which is another potential ARC violation. Look at it this way, by moving your cans out of sight you could actually kill two birds with one stone, which is NOT an ARC violation, but might be a violation of unwritten covenants to live in harmony with neighborhood birds.

In sum:

- Don't ditch your doggy doo in your neighbor's cans (unless they've told you they're OK with that).
- Don't store your trash cans where they can be seen from the street.
- Don't kill two birds with one stone unless it's metaphorical.

Welcome to the many new families who have joined the Kingston Chase community recently! For your reference, and for anyone interested in a refresher, the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) would like to provide a quick review of the most commonly received applications and questions. For the complete ARC Guidelines, please visit <u>www.kchoa.org/architectural-review-committee</u>.

Applications: Any change to the exterior of the house or property (front, back, or sides) requires an ARC application before work begins. The only exceptions are landscaping and lawn ornaments less than two feet tall. When applying, please include with the application the house plat and details and pictures of the colors and materials to be used in the project.

Fences: All fences require an application. Kingston Chase allows board-onboard fences with no overlapping boards, estate fences, and picket fences. Stockade fences are not allowed and will not be approved.

Sheds: All sheds require an application. Sheds may not be more than 8.5 feet tall at their peak and must have an area of 160 square feet or less. Homeowners are encouraged to choose shed designs and colors that match the house and are in keeping with the earth tones found throughout the neighborhood.

Driveway Extensions: Driveway extensions require an ARC application and are considered on a case-by-case basis. They are rarely approved. Driveways cannot extend past the edge of the garage and Fairfax County does not allow any alteration to the apron, the piece of concrete or asphalt that connects the road, the sidewalk, and the driveway.
